Middlewich Primary School opened in September 1999 with the amalgamation of Middlewich Infant School and Middlewich Junior School.

The children start our school in the academic year in which they become 5 years old. We currently have 408 children on roll, from the ages of 4 to 11 years old.

We are very proud of the excellent learning environment we offer. Our building is fantastic, and incorporates the latest thinking in planning and layout, building standards and information technology. Every classroom is very well resourced and specifically designed to complement the curriculum and support pupils' learning.

We work hard to develop good relationships with parent/carers. Education is a partnership between home and school and we place a great deal of emphasis on establishing close working with you. We believe that children learn best when home and school work together for their benefit. When your child starts school, it is not where your job ends and ours begins. It is where our job begins and yours continues.

Children coming into our school bring a wealth of knowledge and understanding about the world around them. It is our aim to build on these skills and promote a willingness and enthusiasm to learn more. We offer a broad curriculum with children often reinforcing their learning through educational visits. We also invite specialists to come into school, such as artists and music teachers who work in class alongside our children.

School Aims

At Middlewich Primary School we are committed to offering the very best care and education to all our pupils in order that they can be the best they can possibly be. We strive to do our best and be our best selves by following our five core principles:

1. Children

The needs of our children lie at the heart of all we do. We work to make sure that every child at our school is seen as an individual and is encouraged to achieve to their full potential in a safe, nurturing environment. We listen to the children in our school and encourage them to have a strong voice within it. We actively promote the principles of the Every Child Matters Agenda.

2. Learning

The core purpose of our school is teaching and learning. We understand that learning is life-long and continuous so staff, governors and children all work to develop their skills, extend their knowledge and deepen their understanding. We never stop learning.

3. Quality

We aim for the highest quality in all we do. The whole school environment is a reflection of this and we seek to provide quality learning with quality resources in a quality environment.

4. Continuous Improvement

We believe that we can always improve and we evaluate what we do with a determination to make it even better. We know we will never be perfect but we will never stop trying to be.

5. Team work.

We are committed to working as a team, and within teams, for the good of the school. We know that we need to work together if we are to achieve our best. We create a mutually supportive and trusting climate, using each other's strengths. We value the contributions of all stakeholders and outside agencies and work with them as partners.

There are a number of specific ways the school endeavours to meet its aims.

Academic

At the primary age it is important that pupils are given opportunities to achieve success in their academic work in order that they develop positive attitudes towards learning. Middlewich Primary School endeavours to provide pupils with a broad education in which all subjects of the curriculum are taught in an interesting and stimulating manner. Pupils are provided with opportunities to achieve their full potential academically and we believe that it is important that their personal successes are recognised and celebrated by both teachers and the children. This praise can take the form of positive comments by the class teacher, written praise by the child's work, the use of class rewards and our school stamper system.

<u>Social</u>

It is important that children learn to become self confident and be able to respect others. The older pupils are encouraged to have a caring attitude towards younger children attending the school. In year 6, pupils are given the opportunity to apply for a Year 6 Responsibility Role. Children are given opportunities to work together in groups and understand that everyone has a right to be able to express his or her opinion.

Environmental

The school is situated in attractive grounds and we encourage pupils to be aware of the natural world and how important it is that we protect our environment. We have a committee within our Year 6 responsibility team which organise events and activities. They encourage children and adults to carry out activities which can help to improve both our local and the world environment.

Artistic

The appreciation of art is seen as an important element in the curriculum at Middlewich Primary School. Children from both key stages study the styles of the great artists and are encouraged to develop their own potential for artistic expression.

Music plays a significant part in the school life. Children are encouraged to learn to play musical instruments.

At present our year 5 children have the opportunity to learn on musical instrument, free of charge. This tuition is paid for by the school. Instruments vary; string, wind and brass. Lessons take place on Friday mornings in the Infant school hall.

A private company also sends tutors into school for one to one private tuition. There is a small charge made for this.

Sporting

Sport has a high profile at the school. Pupils are encouraged to develop a variety of sporting skills during PE lessons. In addition, both boys and girls have an opportunity to join various after school sports clubs which are organised by members of the teaching staff. The school also participates in inter-school football, netball and swimming competitions.

Our P.E. and games lessons are taught by Mr. C. Holbrooks, who is a qualified instructors and takes the children twice a week for P.E./ Games. After school and holiday clubs are also provided by our P.E. teacher. The extra curricular activities do have a cost.

When your child moves into the junior part of their education they will have to opportunity to take part in swimming lessons for 9 to 10 weeks per year. The cost of transport and lessons is met by the school. We believe that in a town that has rivers and canals it is essential that children are able to swim.

The School Day (As of the 2022-2023 Academic Year)

The school day commences between 8.40 a.m and 8.50a.m

KS2 Lunch 12.00 p.m to 12.45 p.m. KS1 Lunch 12.15 p.m. to 1.15 p.m.

KS2 Break 1.45 p.m. to 2.00 p.m. KS1 Break 2.00 p.m to 2.15 p.m.

The school day ends at 3.15 p.m. infants and 3.20 p.m. juniors.

We aim to have all children in their classrooms by 8.50 a.m. The doors open at 8.40am. Children enter through their nearest entrance. Reception children should enter via the infant reception doors.

Attendance

If your child is absent from school because of illness, or any other reason than holiday, please telephone the school before 9.30 a.m.

If you wish to apply for holiday in term time (for exceptional circumstances) please obtain a holiday form from the main office.

School Meals

Children may have school meals or a packed lunch. We are a nut free school, therefore we ask that you do not send your children to school with any food containing nuts.

Our school meals are nutritious and good value. As well as a choice of food there is a daily salad bar available to the children. Menus are available from our school kitchen.

The present cost of a school meal is £2.35 per day.

P.E.

Children will change for PE lesson.

Please ensure that all your child's clothes are labelled with their name and class. Jewellery is not part of the uniform. Earrings especially can be a safety hazard if worn for PE / Games. Pupils who have pierced ears are allowed to wear studs only.

Charging Policy

For activities during school time, including visits from outside speakers, workshops or visits by children to places of educational interest, no charge will be made, but voluntary contributions will be invited in order for trips to take place. Parents will be informed of the amount of money required. However, no child will be placed at a disadvantage because of a parent's unwillingness or inability to pay. If, as a direct consequence of a number of parents not paying the voluntary contribution for the cost of the activity/ event, it is cancelled and all monies will be returned.

Administration of Medicines

It is preferable that parents come into school to administer medicines to their children. It is recognised that this is not always possible. If parents wish to have a member of staff administer **prescribed** medicine to a pupil please ask for a form which is available in the school office. We cannot give medicine to any child without this form.

If your child is asthmatic special provision is made for them in order that they can always access their inhalers if they need them.

Your Child's Education

The school aims to enable pupils to fulfil their highest potential in all areas of the curriculum. All children's' successes are recognised and celebrated whether they be academic, sporting or social.

The Curriculum

Curriculum plans and aims are available to view on our school website.

The key to academic success is to become literate and numerate. We lay great emphasis on promoting these areas of the curriculum. Children receive daily lessons in both mathematics and English. The school is continually making sizeable investments in resources in both English and mathematics, which will benefit children in both Key Stages. This will ensure that the school is able to respond effectively and positively to the teaching of English and maths.

It is the belief of teachers at this school that all areas of the curriculum are extremely important. Children need to experience a broad and balanced education in order that their talents and aptitudes can be fostered. Subjects taught are: -

Religious Education

Religious Education is also part of the school's curriculum. The children receive instruction about Christianity and also learn about other major world religions. Religious education is non-denominational and the teaching carried out in the school emphasises the importance for individuals to possess core moral values. These values include understanding the needs of others, respecting others, caring for others and recognising the need for individuals to adopt appropriate modes of polite behaviour.

Whole school assemblies happen weekly and introduce and then review themes for each week.

On occasions members of the community, including ministers from the local churches, lead our assemblies.

Parents have a right to withdraw their children from religious education. Please speak to Ms. La Porta or Mrs. G. Reynolds (Headteacher) if you wish to withdraw your child from religious education.

Special Educational Needs (SEND)

The school uses a number of strategies to assess the learning needs of children. The forms these assessments take are: - NFER tests, teacher assessment, national tests, baseline assessments in the reception classes (YR) and reports from outside agencies such as educational psychologists. The policy of the school is to identify any pupils with learning difficulties as early as possible and then, in close consultation with parents, work out strategies to help the individual pupils overcome any educational needs. It needs to be emphasised that the school believes the quickest way to achieve success with pupils having special educational needs is by working in partnership with parents.

Resourced Provision for Hearing Impairment

The school has resourced provision for hearing impaired (HI) pupils. This consists of a specialist Teacher of the Deaf and three specialist teaching assistants. A well-resourced room, which contains a quiet room, is available for focused withdrawal and specialist teaching 1:1 or in small groups. HI pupils are integrated as fully as possible into their mainstream class and they are encouraged to play an active role in school life. Support is given to facilitate access to the curriculum and there are close working relationships between all staff to secure this. Additional support is provided at break and lunch times where needed.

Parents are kept well informed through the use of the home / school book which is completed daily. Parents are encouraged to contact the Teachers of the Deaf via the home / school book or by phone to discuss any queries.

The school has a Total Communication approach. Signing (Sign Supported English and British Sign Language) is also incorporated into many aspects of school life and used by both hearing and HI staff and pupils.

The school benefits from the weekly support of a deaf teaching assistant who is also a representative on the school's governing body.

The school has an active and enthusiastic signing choir run by the HI staff.

Growing Up

In Year 5 and 6 pupils receive a talk about changes to the body which take place at the onset of puberty.

The children in other age groups will, on occasions, receive lessons about growth and healthy living. Individual questions raised by children will be answered in a manner which takes into account the age and maturity of the individual pupils.

Parents' Consultations

Parent's evenings are held in the autumn and spring terms and end of year reports sent out in the summer. This is an opportunity for parents to review their children's' work and to discuss their progress with the class teacher. Pupils' progress is reviewed and targets are given in the autumn and spring meetings. The summer report outlines children's progress in all subjects throughout the year. The report for Y2 and Y6 pupils includes results from the National Tests.

If parents wish to discuss issues regarding their children during the year please speak to the teacher at the door in the morning/afternoon to arrange a telephone consultation.

Extra-Curricular Activities

At Middlewich Primary School, we supplement the formal curriculum with extracurricular opportunities for pupils in order to extend their knowledge and understanding and to improve their skills by offering a range of artistic, creative and sporting opportunities.

Teaching staff as well as teaching assistants offer a range of extra-curricular activities that run at either lunchtime or after school. Please note all after school clubs cost £1.00 per week, per club. We do not charge for lunch time clubs.

Extra-curricular clubs run for either a half term or term.

Clubs are reviewed at the end of each term to ensure a range of opportunities are made available for all year groups.

Parents and the school

Parents are encouraged to participate in the life of the school. There is a Parent Teacher Association (PTA). Every parent is a member of this and is welcome to attend committee meetings. This group organises social events for parents and children and also engages in a number of fund-raising activities to support the school. These events include an annual summer barbecue and Christmas raffle. Our P.T.F.A. are a very valued part of our school and help to provide many opportunities for the children both inside and outside of the classroom.

The school and the Community

Middlewich Primary School will continue to develop the ties with the local community which the previous Middlewich schools have established. We also intend to develop close links with pre-school organisations in the community. It is the intention that pupils attending Middlewich Primary School learn about their home locality and understand the ways individuals can make important contributions to improve their community.

Middlewich Primary School encourages this in a number of ways. We have pupils from Middlewich High School and other local schools who visit us to carry out work experience. We have regular contacts with pre school agencies such as the local playgroups and nurseries.
